## SLAMS - ACE ASKING

## BEGINNERS - Just Use 4 CLUBS for Aces

- Newer Players: Just Use 4C Ace Asking (Gerber). $4 \mathrm{D}=0$ or $\mathbf{4} . \mathbf{4 H}=1.4 \mathrm{~S}=\mathbf{2} .4 \mathrm{NT}=3$.
- 4C Ace Asking: After Major \& Minor Raises \& after NT. Even if Raised suit is Clubs.
- Use 4NT - as a Quantitative Invite to Slam when No Suit is Agreed upon. You are asking partner to bid 6 with a Maximum hand for his previous bidding. Otherwise, he should Pass.
- Learn Info Below a little Later, But it doesn't hurt to read it now.


## GENERAL

- Use Ace Asking: Only when you know for Sure that you are going to Slam (32+) \& After you have investigated for a Fit. When you ask, you are merely checking to see if, by chance, you are Missing 2 Aces.
- Ace Asking is Overrated: If $32+$, it is often just better to Blast to Slam. Very Rarely will you be missing 2 aces. The less bidding, the less chance for a Screw-up (misinterpreting 4C \& 4NT), or for helping opponents.
- Voids: Don't Ace Ask with a Void, or with a poor Doubleton (no A or K) in an unbid suit. Cuebid Controls.
- Use Quantitative Bids \& Cuebid Controls (A, K, Stiff, Void): When you are in the Slam Range.


## 4C GERBER - AFTER NOTRUMP

- $1 \mathrm{NT}-4 \mathrm{C}$ (Gerber) Ace Asking: $4 \mathrm{D}=0$ (or 4 ). $4 \mathrm{H}=1.4 \mathrm{~S}=2.4 \mathrm{NT}=3$.
- $1 \mathrm{NT}-2 \mathrm{C}-2 \mathrm{H}$ or $2 \mathrm{~S}-4 \mathrm{C}=$ Gerber with a Major fit.
- $1 \mathrm{NT}-2 \mathrm{C}-2 \mathrm{H}$ or $2 \mathrm{~S}-4 \mathrm{NT}=$ Quantitative without a fit. It's not Blackwood!!
- $1 \mathrm{NT}-\underline{\mathrm{NTT}}=$ Quantitative. It's not Blackwood!!
- 1NT - 2D (Transfer) - 2H - $4 \mathrm{C}=$ Gerber with 6 Hearts (have at least 6-2 Heart fit).
- 1NT - 2D (Transfer) - 2H - 4NT = Only 5 Hearts \& Quantitative. Not Aces. Answers:

Pass with $\min \& 2$ hearts. Bid 5H with $\min \& 3$ hearts.
Bid 6H with max \& 3 hearts. Bid 6NT with max \& 2 Hearts.
No point in transferring \& then ace asking, when you First need to learn if H fit or not.

- 1NT-2D(Transfer)-2H-5NT (Pick a Slam) = Bid 6H, 6NT, or a 5 -card Minor (as an option).


## 4NT BLACKWOOD - AFTER AN AGREED MAJOR

- 4 NT (Blackwood) Ace Asking: $5 \mathrm{C}=0$ (or 4 ). $5 \mathrm{D}=1.5 \mathrm{H}=2.5 \mathrm{~S}=3$.
- Then $5 \mathrm{NT}=$ King Asking. Answers are the same.
- $1 \mathrm{H}-3 \mathrm{H}-4 \mathrm{NT}: 5 \mathrm{C}=0$ (or 4 ). $5 \mathrm{D}=1.5 \mathrm{H}=2.5 \mathrm{~S}=3$.
- $1 \mathrm{H}-2 \mathrm{C}-2 \mathrm{H}-4 \mathrm{NT}$ (implied fit). Answers are the same.
- $1 \mathrm{~S}-2 \mathrm{C}-2 \mathrm{D}-3 \mathrm{~S}-4 \mathrm{NT}$. Answers are the same.
- For 4NT to be Ace Ask, a suit has to be raised, preferenced, or a fit clearly implied.
- Can use Blackwood after a MINOR Fit - but you have little signoff room at the 5-level.
